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Faculty Student Mentor Program

Division of Academic Affairs

The Faculty Student Mentor Program (FSMP) is designed to offer academic and personal support to students from low-income communities or for selected students who have requested services due to challenged experienced in their education.

The **FSMP** goals are to increase retention rates of students and facilitate graduation by providing assistance in developing the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to complete their academic goals, introduce them to a discipline, build communities, and promote excellence.

Faculty and Peer Mentors are key elements to goal attainment. Program participants' integration into the campus life is facilitated by the development of discipline-based faculty and peer mentor teams. The mentors give personal, career and academic advice, and provide referrals to academic advisors and on-campus resources.

About SOC CONNECT

(Soc 196 A & B)

Students with a declared major in Sociology are paired with a mentoring partner to meet at least once a week and engage in goal setting, assist with academic advising, and develop personal relationships. Throughout the semester, mentoring partners attend campus events, visit faculty office hours and explore campus resources. Participants of the mentoring program are advised to research internships, graduate school, and career opportunities.

In an effort to promote lifelong learning, students engage in community building with peers, faculty and staff. Mentoring partners are required to meet with the program director/advisor as well as a student coordinator during orientation, mid-semester check-in, end-of-semseter meeting and as needed during scheduled office hours.

SOC Connect seeks to promote leadership and academic excellence. Mentoring partners enrolled in SOC 196 A, must submit weekly on-line assignments including journals or blogs, and a final essay reflecting on their experience in the program. Mentoring partners enrolled in SOC 196 B follow the same criteria with the exception of an additional leadership-based curriculum to provide a framework for mentoring.

Credits

Mentoring partners receive credit for their participation in SOC Connect. Students enrolled in SOC 196 A are awarded 1 credit, and students enrolled in SOC 196 B are awarded 3 credits upon completion of the semester-long mentorship,

Student Coordinator

Students have the opportunity to apply for the position of student coordinator where he/she can advise and orient students during office hours by assisting the mentoring cohort under the direction of the program advisor.

When Dr. Udayagiri came to me with her plan for SOC Connect, I could not pass up the opportunity. From the beginning, I knew this would be a successful program because of the passion and drive that Dr. Udayagiri had to make this program positive and beneficial for students. Because of my work with SOC Connect, I was selected to complete a fellowship at the office of Mayor Kevin Johnson, focusing on his education initiatives and strategizing how to increase graduation rates in local high schools. Having a Sociological background as well as working with mentoring partners prepared me

Additionally, our on-line classroom, Sac CT, allowed me to reach out to mentoring partners as well as during office hours to guide them through their mentorships. Based on their suggestions, I was able to organize workshops and activities for all mentoring partners. 


Campus Resources

Course requirement

The significance of visiting and familiarizing students with the resources available on campus is to assist and help alleviate the stressors associated with college. For some students (especially those who are the first in their family to attend college) campus life can create tensions and conflicting expectations in the classroom as well as from family and friends. Therefore, students are required to aquaint themselves with the services on campus and they are encouraged to develop supportive relationships with students, faculty and staff.

Save Higher Education

Sacramento State students and members of the California Faculty Association (CFA) protested against fee increases, mandated furloughs, decreased class offerings, closed enrollments and ongoing hardships limiting accessibility and quality of higher education. Students and faculty struggled to adjust to reduced class time, increased tuition, and pay cuts. A series of rallies at the California state Capitol in Sacramento were held throughout the month of March to raise awareness of the struggles for both students and faculty.

On March 4, 2010, Sociology students united in solidarity with Sacramento State alumni, community supporters, and parents of students in public education to rally and educate state legislators on the importance of public education for the future of the state of California.

SOC Connect mentoring partners worked together during Sociology Club meetings to create signs for the rallies. Student organizations, including the Sac State Coalition, organized and promoted opportunities for students to speak out against budget cuts to the California State University and University of California systems.
